Hiroshima and Nagasaki Debate



On August 6th, 1945 the United States dropped an atomic bomb, Little Boy, on the city of Hiroshima, Japan. The purpose of the attack was to force an unrelenting Japanese government and military to surrender, effectively ending the Pacific conflict of World War II. Japan did not accept the terms of surrender, so the United States was forced to use another atomic bomb, Fat Man, on the city of Nagasaki. Finally, on August 15, 1945, Japan surrendered, thus ending World War II.

There were many effects stemming from the usage of the nuclear bomb. Your task is to gain an understanding of this

topic from a historical standpoint, as well as examine the current implications. Your task will be to argue **PRO** (for the usage of the bomb) or **CON** (against the usage of the bomb) with your team of lawyers, and provide compelling, legitimate, and effective evidence proving your side.

- What started the conflict in the Pacific?
- How did the war progress? What were the major battles and what were the outcomes of those battles? How did they affect the big picture of World War II?
- What were strategies used by the United States? What about Japan?
- What are the "numbers" of World War II? (Basically, statistics. How much we were spending?
 How many soldiers lives were lost? How many civilian lives were lost? etc?)
- Where there other options for ending the war?

THE BOMB:

- What exactly is an atomic bomb? What does it do?
- · Who created the atomic bomb?
- · How did the creators feel about their accomplishment?
- · What were the immediate effects of the bomb? What were the long term effects of the bomb?
- · What is radiation?

THE CONSEQUENCES:

- What were the results from the United States usage of the atomic bomb in 1945?
- Have any other important historical events been associated with our actions?
- What is the Cold War?
- What is the Nuclear Arms race?
